Dear Parents and Carers.

This week is Child Protection Week. An annual event to promote the importance of protecting every child in every community. This year's theme builds on the message "Every Conversation Matters" with a call to action: "Shifting Conversation to Action."

This year's theme highlights that while open discussions are crucial, words alone are not enough: we must turn dialogue into meaningful action. While conversations can raise awareness, challenge harmful norms, and spark new ideas, real change happens when we take steps to create safer environments for children that prevent them from harm.

This year, we are focusing on moving beyond conversations to concrete actions that prevent harm and instead, focusing on strengthening support systems, and empowering communities to actively protect children.



By shifting from conversation to action, we can ensure that every child not only feels heard but also experiences real safety, care, and protection. One of the actions we regularly teach children in school is the 5 trusted adults hand.

Why do we have saints?

In the New Testament, all Christians were called saints. This name showed that when people were baptised and became Christians, they came close to God and so were holy. Their faith in Christ made them God's family.

Being called a saint did not mean that they had led remarkable lives or had been very pious. They were saints because God had called them and had made them holy. They were members of Christ's body, Christ's brothers and sisters, and children of God.

The lives of these holy people were so attractive that they drew many people to faith. People saw their Christian faith as real and attractive in their lives, and they confirmed their belief that God was close to them and working in the community.

The place of saints

It is helpful to have people in our lives, both dead and living, near and close, in whom we see the kind of faith and life that God invites us to share. We may also find it helpful to have as part of our lives saints to whom we can talk, and whom we can bring into our prayers. They give us a rich, living sense of the Church. We see the Church as more than a collection of individuals. It is a community of people spread through time as well as space, who are never lost from memory simply because they live in another continent and another century.

Saints keep our eyes fixed on what matters in life. They show us that what matters is what God can do in our lives. They invite us as a community to make evident the attractiveness and power of Christ in our lives and world, and to be what we are – saints.

St Carlo Acutis

On Sunday a new saint was canonised into the family of Christ. St Carlo Acutis was a young person who dedicated a lot of time to spreading the message of the Gospel by creating an extensive website which documented all the miracles attributed to the Eucharist. He was only 15 years old when he died from leukemia.

After a long period to determine his genuine devotion to God and miracles performed in his name, he is now the Catholic Church's first millennial saint and patron of the internet.





Strengthening Home-School Partnerships



from organisers and teachers alike. They tackled complex problems—some that even challenged the attending teachers—with enthusiasm and determination.


