
Dear Parents and Carers,

This week the Term Four invoice for 2026 school fees will be issued, completing our first year under the All-Inclusive Fee Model. As we head into the last quarter under the new fee structure it is an opportunity to reflect on the implementation of the new model and to thank our families for their commitment in supporting St Joseph's by paying their school fees in a timely manner. Feedback around the All-Inclusive Fee Model has been positive. Many families have seen the benefits to the model, knowing what they need to budget for the year with all costs associated with whole year level curriculum offerings covered by the All-Inclusive Fee.



St Joseph's welcomes families who respect and support our Catholic Identity, and who seek our values. It is important to remember that in choosing a Catholic education that includes a commitment to paying School fees, which together with Federal and State government funding, supports the ongoing provision of quality Catholic education for all students at our school. The funding support recognises the rights of parents to exercise choice in their education providers. The continuing provision of quality Catholic Education for all students in the Diocese requires that all enrolling parents/caregivers pay school fees and levies as and when they fall due.

Continued enrolment at the school is contingent upon the payment of School Fees, as detailed in the School's Schedule of Fees. Student participation in non-core curriculum activities, such as sporting events, excursions and camps are also contingent upon meeting fee payment arrangements.



With Term Four invoices due to be issued shortly it is beneficial to remember that you can view your account information, including balances, in Parent Lounge under the Accounts and Payments tab, and on the Parent Orbit app at any time.


Students at St Joseph's will be able to follow in the footsteps of Mary MacKillop and others like her to build a better world.

### Curriculum Corner - Emma Robinson



During Michael Ymers' visit late last term, he encouraged us to share simple, curriculum-linked everyday activities that parents can do with their children.

Each week this term, I will share a new maths activity for you to explore at home. These suggestions are designed to be fun, engaging and directly connected to what your child is learning at school.

#### **ESTIMATING**

Estimating is an important skill that applies to all areas of mathematics. Whenever possible, ask your children to make a guess or approximation before revealing the exact answer.

- Estimate the number of jellybeans in a jar
- Estimate how many people are in the room
- Estimate how many pieces of bread are in a loaf
- > Estimate the biggest house number on the street you've just turned into
- Estimate how far it is to a point in the distance while driving
- Estimate how long it will take to walk to a particular spot
- Estimate the crowd size at large sporting events, such as football matches
- Estimate how many steps there are from the bottom to the top when walking up stairs

On some occasions, work together to find the actual amount, distance or count and compare it with the estimate. This reflection helps children refine their sense of scale and number over time.

# Talking About School: Why Children Sometimes Find It Hard

'How was school?' is a big question. To answer, your child has to sum up a whole day and that can be hard for children (and even adults!) to do.

A child might really want to say, 'My day was so jam-packed with ideas and classes and social stuff that I don't know where to start'. So, it's usually easier just to say, 'OK'.

### Why talking about school is important

Talking with your child about the school day shows you're interested in what's going on in their life. This interest boosts your child's mental health, happiness and wellbeing. It can also have a very positive effect on your child's behaviour and achievement. It shows your child that you value school and education, which encourages them to value it too.

When you're in touch with your child's feelings about school, you're more likely to see problems before they get too big. This way you can work on overcoming challenges together.

### Strategies for talking about school with your child

When your child first gets home from school in the afternoon, they'll probably be tired and hungry or thinking about other things. It's best to avoid asking your child a lot of questions straight away. You can just let your child know that you're glad to see them and talk about non-school topics for a while. Younger children will probably also like unpacking their bags and going through any notes before you ask about school. Saving questions about homework for later on can also take the pressure off!

Simple, positive and specific questions about parts of the day can get your child talking. It's good to use questions that invite more than a 'yes', 'no' or 'OK' response.



# These tips can help you get a conversation going:

Make time to talk. This can often be when you're doing something routine with your child. For example, your child might like to talk when you're walking the dog or preparing dinner together.

Another great time is during your evening meal, this also allows all members of the family to share.

Give your child your full attention if they want to talk with you about their day.

Take seriously whatever your child tells you. For example, you can say things like 'That's really interesting. Then what happened?' or 'And how do you feel about that?'

Use respectful language when you talk about the school with or in front of your child. For example, 'I can see that's frustrating, but you need to speak respectfully to him/her', or 'Yes, that seems unfair, but perhaps you don't know the whole story'.

Every afternoon or evening will be different. Even if your child usually likes to share their day with you, there'll be days when they don't want to talk. Sometimes it's a matter of sensing your child's mood and picking the right moment. Some days there

might not be a right moment at all and that's OK. This is a typical part of school-age development as children start to shape their own identities and social worlds. As long as your child knows you're available when they're ready to talk.



Hi everyone, Welcome back to what will be an exciting busy term! I have sent home the last Book Club of the year. It will be due back at school by Wednesday **22nd of October**. There are plenty of bargains in this issue, so please take the time to have a browse through, as it is your last opportunity to grab those Christmas presents and stocking fillers. As you already know by purchasing through scholastic book club, you are in fact helping me gain resources for the library and school for free. A big **THANKYOU** to everyone that has purchased from book club, as you can see it has enabled us to keep our library well stocked.

Remember if you order online you <u>DO NOT</u> need to send anything back to school. I have a link where I can download who has put an order in online. When ordering online just go to the parent payment option, you do not need to have a username or password. Please make sure that you select your child's teacher so book club can pack them to the right class, this makes sorting them so much easier. Online ordering is also open a week longer than the due back date at school, so if you miss the school cut off you can order and pay online for another week.

Can you please pop in or flick me an email <u>Jacinta\_elliott@rok.catholic.edu.au</u> if your order is a "Christmas Order" so I can put it aside for you to pick up rather than accidentally send it home with your child!

As we come to the end of another school year, we need to make sure that each book is accounted for, to allow this to happen we will be not borrowing the last 2 weeks of term. This means that all library books will need to be returned to the Library by **Thursday the 20<sup>th</sup> of November**. I will send reminders out closer to the time. To encourage students to remember we will be again awarding a prize to the class who return all their books back first. In previous years this has been very close and is a great motivator to get the students to remember. Also at this time I will need to finalise any books that are missing. Unfortunately, books do go missing quite easily but also have a habit of reappearing just as easily, which is why we don't really worry about books that go missing until the end of the year. If your child has a book that has gone missing and hasn't turned up by the 16<sup>th</sup> of November, we would ask that a replacement of the book, or money be sent in to buy a replacement be sent in that week as well.

From late October I will be putting out the Christmas books and starting Christmas craft in the library at lunchtimes. I know you are thinking why so early but as the library is shut the last week of term and borrowing stops on the 21st of November, we have to fit it all in before those dates. The children really do enjoy this time of year with these activities and so do we.

If your child is in Year 6 and you don't have any more children attending the school we would really appreciate it if you would consider donating your child's library bag to us, this allows children who are new to the school who don't yet have a bag to start borrowing straight away or any child that forgets to bring theirs to be able to continue borrowing as normal.

I hope that you enjoy the last term of school and once again I thank you for your support through Book Club.




